The Governor-in-Council has approved an agreement to transfer land from Echuca District Hospital to the Echuca Physically Disabled Persons' Association.

The transferred land will be used as a site for a centre for the disabled, a project for which the association and its auxiliary have been enthusiastically fund-raising.

The transfer decision was made following a recommendation by the State Health Minister, Mr Roper.

Mr Roper said there had been considerable correspondence to him concerning this transfer and he had been pleased to make the recommendation.

"The co-operation of the hospital in assisting the physically disabled is a very good demonstration of closer relationships between health services," he said

"It is important that the various parts of the State's health services work closely together for all the community, not just for a hospital or a mental health service, or whatever.

"The initative taken in Echuca will be repeated throughout the State with the regionalisation of the Health Commission.

The manager of Echuca District Hospital, Mr Stuart Rowley, said the board had always tried to assist the association wherever possible.

"Making the land available was a positive gesture of support," he said.

"The hospital has been in favor of the transfer right from the start and building should commence in June or July."

Moonshot competing in the un-

Moonshot, competing in the unlimited class, was the outright fastest boat with a time of 39 minutes, 11 seconds.

It was the third year in a row the record of 38 minutes, 25 seconds, set by Rolco in 1982, has stood.

Moonshot took the Leigh Johnson Memorial Trophy as outright winner with crewmen Lester Freemantle of Melbourne, owner and driver; Bill Kelly of Bendigo, and skiers David Tarry of Adelaide and Linc Kelly of Bendigo. Observer was G. O'Brien.

Second fastest boat was Surewood in 40 minutes, 51 seconds, followed by previous winners, the Rolco crew. Second in the 1984 Southern 80 by just .06 of a second, Aquaholic, had overheating problems yesterday and finished the course much later than expected.

Bullet Mercury was the fastest novice boat with a time of 47 minutes, 54 seconds, followed by Sum Toy in 49 minutes, four seconds.

It was the second win in a row for Bullet Mercury which also slashed the novice record of 49 minutes, 12 seconds, set by Mr Ace.

Fastest local boat was once again Barrie Beehag's "BBB" with son Tony observing and daughter-in-law Sue skiing with her sister Caren Robinson.

The last boat left Torrumbarry at 2.17 and an hour later the 20 crash boats dotted along the course were sent looking for 52 boats which had failed to reach the finish.

Seventeen of those were known to have broken down.

Moama Water Sports Club president Mr Jeff Connell said it was usual for about one third of the entries to break down, but added that the conditions were good and the water calm.

More than 200 boats entered the Southern 80 this year, beating last year's record number of 194.

Spectators were also as numerous as usual with several thousand taking up vantage points along the 80-kilometre course to watch the boats and skiers pass by.
